Learning intentions

We are learning to:

- Investigate a topic we are interested in and have studied in class this year
- · Develop our own thoughts on a chosen topic
- · Prepare an oral presentation
- Use extra resources to make our presentation creative

Context and learning activities:

The students will:

- Introduce the topic for their oral presentation
 They will be given time to reflect on the topic
 in groups and consider areas on that topic
 that interests them. Use 2 stars and a wish
 strategy here to identify areas students know
 well and one area to would like to further
 explore for their presentation.
- Evaluate methods they have used in the past to support presentations and reflect on what they feel worked well for them (use ranking ladder).
- Gather relevant class work / notes / books on the topic
- Further investigate the topic using the World Wide Web
- Speak (phone call / face to face visit / survey to people outside of the classroom about their view on the topic chosen
- Watch (http://bit.ly/UALtMF) examples of bad and good presentations and discuss what they can learn from examples shown.
- Collate a list for good practice when doing a presentation.
- Prepare notes for their presentation
- Create visual aid for presentation
- Practice presentations in small groups and be a critical friend to assist each student in your group.
- Presentations 3 minutes per student. All students watch and given opportunity to ask questions.

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Conditions:

- 4 class periods per week (note double class Wednesday, classes only 30 minutes, Thursday class is 35 minutes, Monday 40 minute class)
- Students had access to computers and printer in class.
- Students have covered all topics in class of the year.
- Some students missed 2 of the 6 class periods
- Students have presented class work using storyboards, posters, graphs and Power Point over the year

Time

• 1.5 week x 6 class periods

Success Criteria:

SC1: Communicate eloquently and with confidence

SC2: Show knowledge of the topic

SC3: The presentation is very well-structured (clear start, middle and end)


SC4: The support material is creative and is used effectively to support the presenter

1,100 people died on this day just because the building was not kept up to health and safety standards.









Definitions

Ethics: moral principles that govern a person's behaviour or the conducting of an activity.

Moral Principles: e.g. Knowing right and wrong

To Be Ethical requires individuals/businesses to take the right choice of action

Supply chain: the sequence of processes involved in the production and distribution of a product

Sweatshops: a factory or workshop where manual workers are employed to work in bad conditions for bad pay.

Beyoncé's Life

- Beyoncé was born on September 4th 1981 in Houston Texas.
- Her full name is Beyoncé Giselle Knowles Carter.
- Beyoncé and three other people started a singing group called Destiny's Child in 1997. They released their debut album in 1998, called Destiny child.
- Beyoncé released her debut album, Dangerously in love, in 2003 with Jay Z.
- Her dad quit his job to manage Destiny's Child.
- Money was tight when she was younger.
- Destiny's Child disbanded in 2006.
- Beyoncé and Jay Z got married in 2008.



Ivy Park

- Ivy park was launched in April 2016 and has made millions since it was first launched.
- It is a worldwide company and works on "empowering women through sport".
- It is an active/leisure wear brand based in London.
- The fashion retailer is Topshop.
- It is a very popular brand for teenage girls. In my group of close friends everyone of them have an item of clothing from Ivy Park.
- The clothes from the worldwide business are manufactured in South Asia, where the workers safety laws are either irrelevant or not here at all.



Working Conditions

- The conditions of these manual workers are cramped and damp.
- They work packed together with people from all over the country that have come to find a better life.
- There are people of all ages ranging from the more elderly age of 60 to the younger side of about 10 years old.
- Irony: most of the workers that are in these cramped conditions are women.
- Although the workers are paid over the minimum wage of 13,500 rupees (€80) per month they are being currently paid 18,500 rupees (€110)



Living Conditions

- The workers have to work 60 hours a week for their normal salary and their living quarters are provided for them (with payment) it is long dormitory with no showers or kitchen area.
- The men and women have a shared shower block which is both unhygienic and unsafe.
- The workers are paid \$6 for a piece of clothing worth \$200.
- They workers have restricted freedom, curfews, are locked into their dormitories at night and are not allowed to form unions or committees.
- Beyoncé does have money to spare, earning \$54,000,000.00 and is 107th on Forbes richest list.



My Solutions

- Pay needs to improve in order for workers to live a fulfilled life.
- Recognition of governments that minimum pay has failed the workers and needs to be made higher and a law stating proper working conditions.
- The workers need to be allowed to form trade unions so they can have a voice.



My Conclusions

- Big brands and high prices does not ensure that the company is ethical.
- There is no evidence to prove that Beyoncé is aware of the sweatshop labour.
- Complicated supply chains can disguise the use of sweatshops.
- Look out for the Fair Trade logo when making consumer choices
- Research the retailer before purchasing so we can make ethical choices

Ethics

What is Ethics?

- ▶ Ethics is making decisions bases on your moral principles
- Being Ethical requires you to take the right of choice of action
- Your moral principles are different for every person
- Right from wrong
- Beliefs
- Attitudes

Impact of consumption

- As people we should know the impact of these goods and products have not only in our area ,environmentally and globally.
- Example: Where your clothes are made and who made them

Business Ethics

- For a business to act ethically all these factors must be taken into account
- Production
- Behavior
- Impact (community, environment, planet)
- If a company is ethical it should also be sustainable.
- There are laws to encourage this

- There are different companies that care and don't care. The two companies I have looked at are
- Ivy Park
- ▶ L`oreal

Ivy Park

- Workers were earning €5.00 a week in factory in Sir Lanka
- Rural villages, mostly young women 70%
- Workers live in boarding houses
- Share facilities with men
- ▶ The workers aren't allowed to join a union



L`oreal

- They were named as 2017 most ethical company for the 8th time They have four main principals
- Integrity
- Respect
- Courage
- Transparency



Survey

People can be ethical too.

I did a survey to see would people buy products if they felt the company was unethical

I also asked what companies do people think are unethical.

Survey Findings

▶ I gave three examples of products that people regularly buy;

Clothing from Penny's, Grocery's from Tesco's and a soft drink from any other shop

100% of those who responded said they have bought at least one of these

• I then asked would you still but these products if you knew the company was unethical.

100% of those who responded said they would not buy the products if they thought was unethical.

So clearly people will not buy from a company they feel is unethical

Survey Findings

- ▶ I asked those surveyed to list a company they felt was ethical. Interestingly 60% of those who answered listed "Lush" as a company that is ethical and 30% listed the ice cream maker "Ben and Jerry". The remaining 10% were various other companies
- Finally I asked those surveyed to list a company they felt acted unethically. 70% mentioned the Irish clothing store "Penny's"
