QUESTION: Which languages do you speak?

**Anna**: I speak Serbian fluently and I'm currently taking French, Irish and German lessons.

**Hayden**: Usually when we're out trying to talk to tour-guides or trying to order food somewhere, I'll help people out with the menu or asking for things. I just picked up the confidence I'd say because I'm okay with making mistakes.

### QUESTION: What helps you best to learn a language?

**Hayden**: There's a form of media called Discord where you can text people and make calls. I joined Discord chat for that and I've found it to be really helpful in learning pronunciation and vocabulary.

#### QUESTION: Are there any other languages you'd like to learn in the future?

**Guy**: If I could pick up another language in the future, without a doubt, it would be French - to speak to family. And I'm not sure what I do see myself doing in the future but if I do enter the business world, having my Spanish but also, I think having Japanese or Chinese - Mandarin specifically - would be very useful.

Anna: For me it would definitely be Italian or Greek because I've been to both countries and I plan on visiting both countries a lot more in the future so it definitely would be handy having them as one of those as my languages. To be able to go there and speak to the people. It's probably a very different experience than going there as a tourist that isn't able to speak the language at all. You definitely get a greater appreciation for the culture and for the people when you're able to communicate.

**Hayden:** I want to say Chinese since it's spreading rapidly and more and more people are speaking it. I want to have that so I can communicate with people or use it for work in the future.
